A historicist-style palace house designed by architect Jacobo Galí Lassaleta in 1904. A space that breaks away from the traditional Sevillian patio house, adopting the style of the French bourgeois house, making it a beautiful rarity in the heart of Seville.

Located in the heart of the Jewish Quarter and surrounded by the most characteristic landmarks of the city, this place is an ideal spot to travel back in time through its spaces and surroundings. The palace house consists of three distinct yet interconnected spaces with large wooden and glass doors, adapted to different uses and needs.

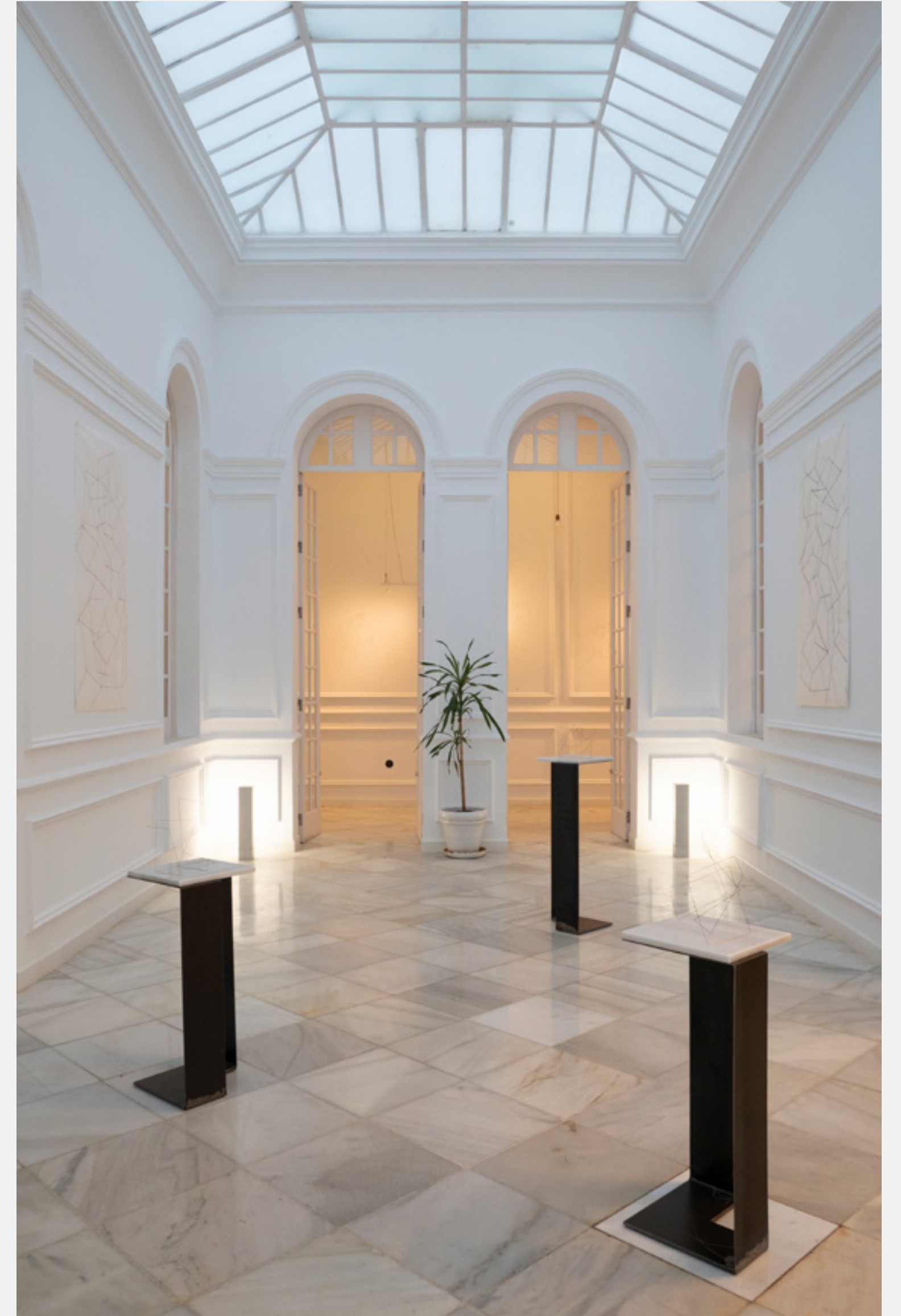


Tragaluz Room

The Tragaluz Room is an original patio with a glass-covered dome, providing its own luminosity, creating a special and very characteristic ambiance.



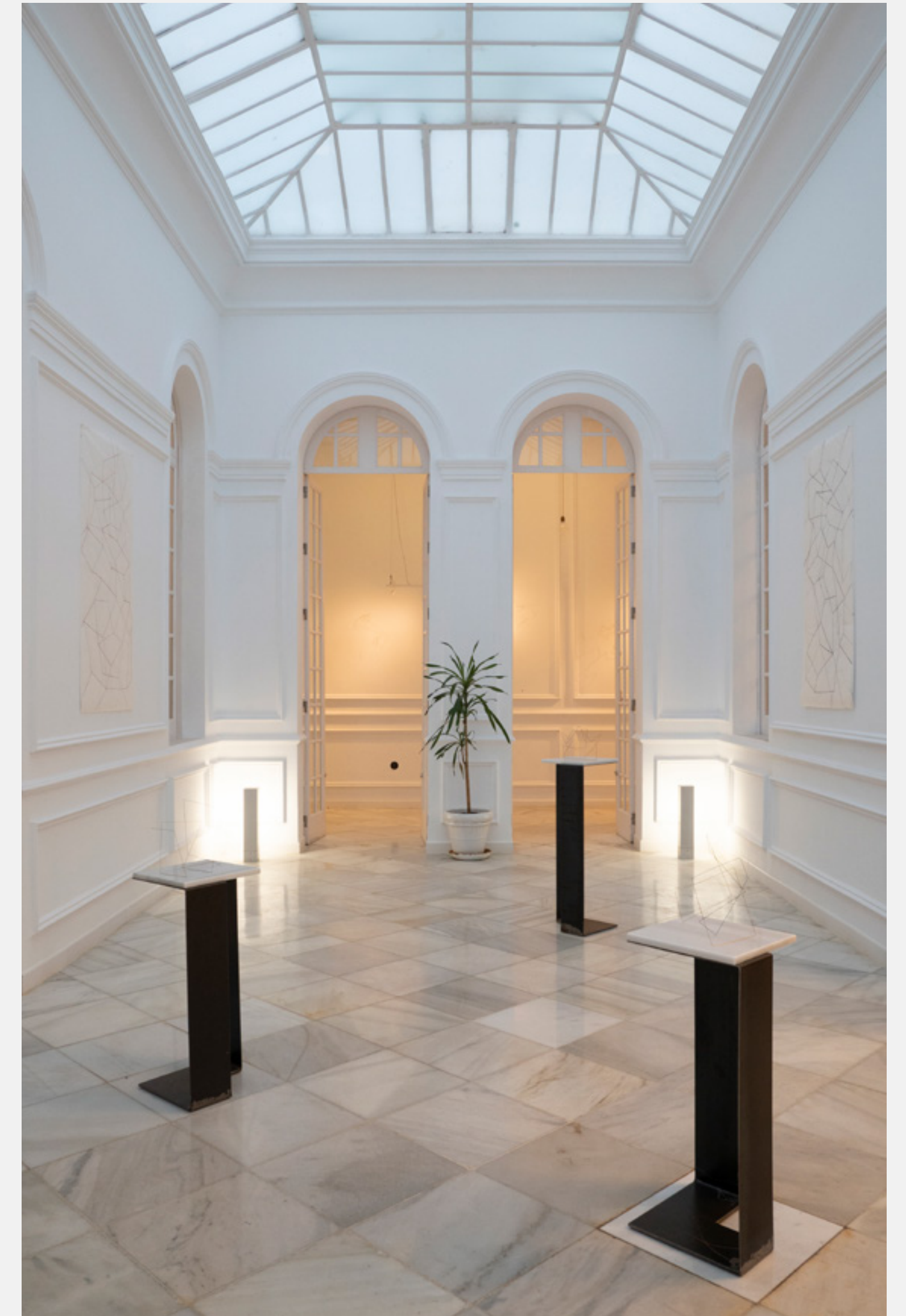


Projection Room
